Trees of West Torrens Chinese pistachio

Description

In Adelaide the Chinese pistachio reaches an approximate height of 5m to 8m and a spread of 6m to 8m after 20 years.

This small, deciduous tree has a moderate growth rate and great autumn colour in shades of orange, yellow and red. Its bark is dark grey with shallow furrows and this variety is capable of withstanding relatively harsh conditions. Its feather-like leaves are green and leathery and inconspicuous clusters of small white flowers are borne in summer, followed by red drupes which mature to blue.

While this species is tolerant of most soil types, a well-drained soil in a sunny position is preferred. A fantastic feature tree in parks and gardens it also very adaptable as a street tree. They provide shade for shade-loving plants to grow underneath. Easily pruned for road and pedestrian clearances, they develop a strong single leader trunk with good overall structure.

Moderately drought tolerant this tree has been successfully used in footpath cutouts (tree pit), as a residential street tree and has grown in urban areas with air pollution, poor drainage and compacted soil.

Tree facts

Removes **110 grams** of harmful air pollution every year.
