Description

In Adelaide the Chinese tallow reaches an approximate height of 5m to 8m and a spread of 4m to 6m after 20 years.

It is a small, attractive deciduous tree with round or oval sharply pointed leaves, turning red in autumn. The leaves are alternate, broadly pear-shaped, dark green above and much paler below with a tapering apex.

The tree's flowers are tiny and in small clusters arranged in terminal spikes; male flowers are yellow-green while female flowers (if present) will be found at the base of the flowering head.

The Chinese tallow's fruit is a capsule which is green when young becoming black when ripe. When mature, valves fall leaving naked seeds attached to the tree. The seeds are white in colour with approximately three in each capsule.

This trees is hardy to heat and reasonable tolerant to frost and cold. The Chinese Tallow will grow in most soils, but prefers a well-drained sandy loam enriched with organic matter. Once established these trees will thrive in a warm sunny position providing foliage colour in autumn.
