Description

In Adelaide, the Japanese zelkova reaches an approximate height of 8m to 12m and a spread of 6m to 10m after 20 years.

It is a hardy, reasonably fast growing, deciduous wide-spreading tree with an upright vase-shape when young. This tree has narrow heart-shaped leaves which are fine pointed with slender-tipped teeth. The foliage turns a lemon-yellow to bright red colour in autumn.

The Japanese zelkova is a good shade tree with a well-developed deep root system. It prefers rich soils, a cool climate and ample water, however once established it will tolerate periods of drought. This tree is frost resistant and will handle full sun to part shade.

It recommended for buffer strips around parking lots, for median strip plantings along roadways, footpath cut-outs (tree pit), and as a residential street tree. The Japanese zelkova has been successfully grown in urban areas where air pollution, poor drainage and compacted soil are common.

Tree facts

A mature, healthy Japanese zelkova tree at 12 metres tall:

23 of these trees provide enough oxygen for one person for a year.

Provides **79m²** of canopy shade, equal to the shade of **25** beach umbrellas.

Removes 280 grams of harmful air pollution every year.
