Description

In Adelaide the smooth-barked apple maple reaches an approximate height of 15m and spread of 10m after 20 years.

It is a native evergreen tree ideal for creating shade it has a great spreading crown. The tree flowers in spring to early summer with large grouped clusters in a stunning white colour. Although the species is quite large and robust, it has a very forgiving root system with little to minor impact upon infrastructure in comparison to its potential size.

The smooth-barked apple maple is an ideal avenue tree with its natural habit to be tall and upright.

It grows naturally on infertile, acidic sandstone areas with little water holding capacity, hence these trees are useful in harsh median and roadside environments.
