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PREFACE_

This little book was compiled in the first instance for my own reference, following my usual habit of analysing and making notes on the books that I read. The recent interest which has been aroused in the work of Barbara Hanrahan has inspired the preparation of these notes in the form of a booklet so that the material may be made available to a wider public.

Barbara Hanrahan has written of her childhood and early years in Thebarton in <u>The Scent of Eucalyptus</u>, her style being literary, with a happy unconcern about factual accuracy, which one might expect (?) in an autobiography or a history. This is not to say that hers is not a good book. It is a masterpiece of style, of evocation; it is magic, it is life, it is Barbara. And it may be enjoyed for all these things.

But the questions will always persist. What was the real name of this one or that one? Were the police barracks at the end of Rose Street? People will want to know that answers to these and other questions. A few answers will be found in this booklet.

I, too, lived in Rose Street. Barbara calls me "The Professor," and describes my spastic brother, Donald, in somewhat unflattering terms. (I should perhaps add that Donald laughed when he read what Barbara had said about him, and was not in the least offended.) This index is for those readers who want to know a bit more than Barbara has told them. It does not claim to be a work of scholarship. It is nothing more than scattered notes. I hope readers of The Scent of Eucalyptus will find this useful.

It probably had a separate title. The people living there were named Dyer.

On the other side of Rose Street from this point there was the Woodwork Centre of the Thebarton Primary School. The tree stump was at this spot p.92 - and Mrs. Dingle lived in Gladstone Road, not so close as Barbara might lead her readers to believe

This is the lane between Rose Street and Henley

BAMBOO LANE in Dew Street p.49 This is a short and officially unnamed lane beside the chemist's house. I remember that there were bamboos growing at the far end, which must have led into the woodyard which was used by the Cooperage. Access to the woodyard was via the Friendly Lane

Dew Street, from Rose Street to the Henley Beach Road is not given any special notice in the book except for the crossing of the Sinister Lane, and the "paw marks, frozen deep in the concrete, of a dog that was not there" p.137 On the day that the new cement footpath had been laid, a dog, determined to leave its mark in history, trotted happily along the whole length of the street, leaving the paw-marks that Barbara refers to. They are still clearly visible
